MIN 1.0: WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS

- 1.1 The National Coordinator called the meeting to order at 10:28 a.m. He welcomed everyone to the meeting and requested each participant to introduce themselves.
- 1.2 Eng. David Sebagala, a Government Constituency representative, was nominated to preside over the meeting in the absence of the MSG Chairperson.
- 1.3 The meeting Agenda was adopted.

MIN 2.0: COMMUNICATION FROM THE CHAIR

- 2.1 The Chairperson welcomed all members to the 36th MSG meeting. He delivered the opening remarks, appended as Annex A. The key highlights included:
 - a) On Thursday, 7th November 2024, H.E. Ambassador Johan Borgtam, the EU Special Representative for the Great Lakes Region, and his delegation met with UGEITI stakeholders and staff. The meeting focused on addressing the illegal exploitation and trafficking of natural resources. It also highlighted support for initiatives like the EITI, aimed at promoting an African-led model of natural resource management—one that is sustainable, fair, environmentally responsible, and rooted in human rights. The discussions also emphasized the importance of involving the private sector and civil society in these efforts.

- b) In October 2024, the Government of Uganda established the Uganda National Mining Company (UNMC) to manage the state's commercial interests in mining operations.
 - c) The term of service for most MSG members was due to expire in March 2025. The Secretariat had engaged with other EITI National Secretariats to explore ways of ensuring continuity. The Secretariat would notify the different constituencies to initiate the process for nomination of new members.
- 2.2 The Chair advised that, going forward, each agenda item should have a timeslot for effective management of the meeting.

MIN 3.0: REVIEW AND ADOPTION OF THE MINUTES OF THE 35TH MSG MEETING

- 3.1 The Minutes of the 35th MSG Meeting held on Tuesday, 8th October 2024, were reviewed and adopted as a true record of the proceedings.
- 3.2 Matters Arising:
- 3.2.1 The committee appointed to assess the facilitation of MSG members informed the meeting that, they had consulted and discovered that the prevailing rates of sitting allowances were based on the Government's *Standing Instructions No. 4 of 2008 on Revised Rates of Duty Facilitating Allowances*, which stipulated the amounts payable to Public Officers and Non-Public Officers when carrying out official work.
- 3.2.2 According to the document:
- a) Public Officers are entitled to Sitting Allowance of UGX 90,000 and Transport Allowance of UGX 45,000.
 - b) Non-Public Officers are entitled to Sitting Allowance of UGX 140,000 and Transport Allowance of UGX 45,000.
 - c) Chairpersons are entitled to receive the revised rates as outlined in Sections 8.1 and 8.2 of the document for the respective categories of Officers, plus a Transport Allowance of UGX 45,000.
- 3.2.3 Reaction from Members:
- a) The Chair stated that Government had standard rates for per diem, accommodation, transport, and sitting allowances for attending meetings. He emphasized that the Secretariat needed to take into consideration the specific circumstances of each MSG member when paying out allowances. This should include per diem, accommodation, and transport allowances.

He further stated that a member living within Kampala or Wakiso should not receive the same amount as a member traveling from Moroto, Hoima, or Kassanda districts. Members coming from distant locations needed to be paid accommodation, per diem and transport allowances i.e. a two-day per diem to ensure a comfortable stay in Kampala for the meeting.

He noted that this was crucial because members incurred expenses to attend MSG meetings.

- b) A member from the Civil Society Constituency proposed that the current rates should be revised to reflect the prevailing economic conditions. However, he advised that the MSG should adhere to Government Standing Orders. He also noted that the rates recommended by the Committee did not account for accommodation and per diem for members traveling from upcountry.

3.2.3 The meeting resolved that the committee should harmonise the rates based on the proposals of the meeting and ensure that the mileage, per diem, transport refund and sitting allowance are all taken into consideration.

MIN 4.0: REVIEW AND ADOPTION OF THE ADDENDUM TO THE EITI REPORT FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2021/2022

- 4.1 The Head of Secretariat presented the draft Addendum to the Third UGEITI Report (FY 2021/2022), appended as Annex B. She informed the meeting that the addendum was developed to address data gaps and compliance challenges that arose in the third EITI report.
- 4.2 The main purpose of the addendum was to:
 - a) Enhance the data quality and assurance of the report; and
 - b) Reduce the reconciliation gap for revenues reported by Companies and Government entities.
- 4.3 The achievements highlighted in the addendum were submission of:
 - a) Certified Government templates and signed templates by DGSM;
 - b) Signed templates by Virat Alloys confirming that their activities were solely manufacturing and not extractive;
 - c) Completed templates from Hima and National Cement.
- 4.4 The meeting was informed that the addendum reduced the reconciliation gap from 52% to 15%.
- 4.5 Reaction from Members:
 - a) The Chair advised the Secretariat to work closely with the regulators such as DGSM to improve compliance during the process of data collection.
- 4.6 Following the discussion, the MSG approved the Addendum to the third EITI report.

MIN 5.0: PRESENTATION AND REVIEW OF THE STRATEGIC PLAN FOR THE FY 2025/2026 to FY 2029/2030

- 5.1 The Consultant presented the Strategic Plan for the period FY 2025/2026 to FY 2029/2030, appended as Annex C. Her presentation highlighted the following:

- a) The Strategic Objectives for period FY 2025/26 to FY 2029/30 were; (1) Enhancing data disclosure in the extractive sector, (2) Facilitating information sharing among stakeholders, (3) Strengthening the management of extractive sector revenues, and (4) Building the operational and technical capacity of the Multi-Stakeholder Group (MSG) and Secretariat. These objectives are aligned with the national priorities of the fourth National Development Plan (NDP IV).
 - b) Regarding financing and implementation, the Strategic Plan would be implemented through Government and donor funding.
 - c) A robust Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) framework would be used to track progress and ensure compliance with the EITI Standards, and measure impact of EITI implementation. UGEITI planned to conduct mid-term and end-of-term evaluations, ensuring the strategic plan remained relevant and responsive to emerging challenges.
- 5.2 Reaction from members:
- a) Members noted that the presentation was too summarized and that they had anticipated the comprehensive brief detailing the key highlights of the Strategic Plan.
 - b) They also inquired if the plan considered new initiatives for enhancing transparency and accountability in the extractive sector.
 - c) Furthermore, members inquired why the Theory of Change was not included in the strategic plan.
- 5.3 The MSG agreed that the Strategic Plan be reshared with MSG members comments within a period of two weeks.

MIN 6.0: PRESENTATION AND REVIEW OF THE WORK PLAN FOR THE FY 2024/2025 TO FY 2026/2027

- 6.1 The National Coordinator presented UGEITI's work plan for the FY 2024/25 to FY 2026/27 appended as Annex D. The highlights of the presentation included:
- a) The meeting was required to approve the FY 2024/2025 Work Plan and to review the work plan for FY 2025/2026 to FY 2026/2027.
 - b) The key activities of the FY 2024/2025 Work Plan focused on enhancing transparency, accountability, and revenue management in Uganda's extractive sector. These included disseminating EITI report findings, strengthening stakeholder engagement, and institutional capacity development.

- c) Regarding the work plan for FY 2025/2026 to FY 2026/2027, emphasis would be placed on data disclosure, information sharing, revenue management, stakeholder collaboration, conducting research to support policy reforms and development of institutional capacity.
- d) The strategies proposed included establishing partnership and collaboration among all stakeholders in order to enhance compliance with the EITI Standard.
- e) Funding for implementing work plan activities would be sourced from Government and other partners.

6.2 Reaction from members:

- a) A representative from the Government constituency inquired whether the work plans aligned with the broader Government framework of the NDP IV programmes.
- b) The MSG recommended the development of a five-year work plan instead of a three-year work plan in order to align with the NDP IV.
- c) A representative from the industry constituency advised that the proposed five-year work plan should be aligned to the Strategic Plan.
- d) A member from the Civil Society constituency expressed the need for a detailed work plan for FY 2025/2026 to FY 2026/2027.

6.3 Decisions on the Work Plan:

- a) The Work Plan for FY 2024/2025 was approved.
- b) The MSG agreed on the development of a five-year work plan that was aligned with the Strategic Plan.

MIN 7.0: WAY FORWARD

7.1 The MSG resolved as follows:

- a) Publish the Addendum to the Third EITI Report.
- b) The Secretariat should circulate the draft Strategic Plan for the members to submit comments within a period of two weeks.
- c) Develop a work plan aligned with the Strategic Plan.
- d) The committee on MSG allowances should harmonise the allowance rates based on the proposals of the meeting.
- e) The Secretariat should notify the different constituencies to initiate the process for nomination of new members.

7.2 There being no any-other-business, the Chairperson thanked members for their valuable contributions and active participation, and adjourned the meeting at 2:15 p.m.

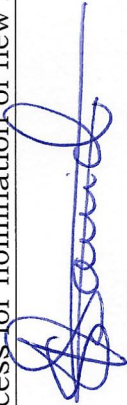
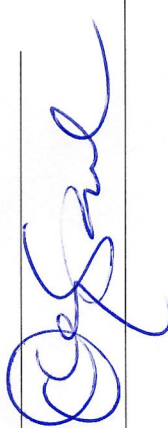

**REMARKS OF THE MSG CHAIRPERSON AT THE 36TH EITI
MULTISTAKEHOLDER GROUP MEETING HELD ON 20TH
FEBRUARY 2025, AT IMPERIAL ROYALE HOTEL KAMPALA.**

Ladies and Gentlemen

Good morning

- 1.** First, I wish to welcome you to this 36th Meeting of the Multi-Stakeholder Group (MSG) of the Uganda Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI).
- 2.** As you are aware, since our MSG meeting, a number of activities have been undertaken. To begin with, various engagements have been held between key players in the industry, MSG and the Secretariat to address the gaps in the Third UGEITI Report. This has resulted in the Addendum to the Third UGEITI Report.

3. The UGEITI Secretariat has been working closely with the Independent Administrator and the reporting entities to prepare the addendum to the EITI Report and it will be presented to us at this meeting for our consideration.
4. Members, the addendum emanates from the Third UGEITI Report that was launched in October 2024. The report covered FY 2021/2022 and it provides a comprehensive assessment of our compliance with the EITI Standard, encompassing data disclosure, revenue generation, legal frameworks, local content, environmental concerns, and social expenditures.
5. In addition, UGEITI Secretariat participated in and supported the organisation of the **13th Annual Mineral Wealth Conference** that took place from 1st - 2nd October 2024 organized by the Uganda Chamber of Mines and Petroleum in collaboration with other stakeholders. The theme of the conference was “Leveraging Critical Minerals for Sustainable Development and Economic Transformation.”
6. Also to note, was our participation at the **7th Citizens’ Convention on Extractives** that was organised by Global Rights Alert on 23rd October 2024. The theme of the convention was “Towards a Cross-Generational and Just Energy Transition for Africa.” This in

particular is an important topic considering the trends and developments concerning energy transition.

- 7.** On 7th November 2024, H.E Ambassador Johan Borgtam, the EU Special Representative of the Great Lakes Region and his delegation, held a meeting with representatives of the MSG at the Secretariat's offices. The discussion focused on the issue of illegal exploitation and trafficking of natural resources in the region.
- 8.** Furthermore, in October 2024, GOU established the Uganda National Mining Company (UNMC) to manage to manage the commercial interests of the country in the mining sector including all state equity in mining operations. This would help to ensure that our nation's mineral wealth benefits all Ugandans. The operationalization of the Uganda National Mining Company (UNMC) marks a pivotal advancement in Uganda's extractive sector. This development reflects Uganda's dynamic and evolving extractive sector, highlighting efforts to boost economic growth while addressing environmental and social challenges.
- 9.** Members, during the last MSG meeting, we set up a Committee to look into the issue of the sitting allowance for members. The Committee was tasked to consult with other Government institutions about allowances to facilitate upcountry delegates for similar engagements as our MSG meetings. I have been informed

by the Secretariat that this Committee met and we shall get feedback from them in this meeting.

10. Also, a separate committee was instituted and tasked to review our draft Strategic Plan for the next five years covering the period from FY 2025/2026 to FY 2029/2030. I am happy to note that the committee sat on numerous occasions to review the draft strategic plan. This has resulted in the final strategic plan draft that will be shared today.

11. As I conclude my remarks, I take this opportunity to remind Colleagues that the majority of the MSG members' terms are coming to an end next month. This is in accordance with our Terms of reference. The UGEITI Secretariat has consulted widely with other EITI national secretariats on how to ensure continuity in the MSG. The Secretariat intends to communicate the MSG about this so that the different MSG constituencies can embark on the processes of nominating members to the MSG.

12. With those few remarks, I wish to commend all of you for tirelessly supporting and steering the EITI implementation process.

13. I wish you all fruitful deliberations.

1. ADDENDUM

Uganda produced its third EITI report in October 2024. The UGEITI report for the fiscal year 2021-22 considered information received up to the 2nd of September 2024. Information received after the publication of the UGEITI report for the fiscal year 2021-22 was incorporated in this addendum.

The main purpose of the addendum was to

- 1) Enhance the data quality and assurance of the report; and
- 2) Reduce the reconciliation gap for revenues reported by companies and the government.

These objectives were achieved through the receipt of:

- OAG audit certification for URA templates and the receipt of signed templates from DGSM;
- Virat Alloys, a company identified within the reconciliation scope also submitted a signed template confirming that their activities were solely manufacturing and not extractive;
- templates from the two highest revenue-paying cement companies in the reporting period, namely Hima Cement and National Cement Company. Both these companies submitted completed templates.

With the additional information submitted above, the data quality assurance and comprehensiveness in the report were enhanced, which resulted in the reconciliation gap being reduced from over 52% to 15% as detailed in Section 1.2 of this addendum.

The detailed results of the additional data incorporated are presented below.

1.1 Completeness and Data Assurance Quality

A summary of the comprehensiveness and data assurance quality is presented below. The detailed submissions are presented in Annex 5 of this addendum.

Comprehensiveness

Extractive entities

Twelve (12) companies submitted declaration forms. The revenues reported by the URA for these companies represent 84.7% of the government revenues from the extractive sector and are detailed as follows:

Government Agencies

All government agencies submitted their completed declaration forms.

Conclusion on the Comprehensiveness

Except for the matter outlined above, we can conclude with reasonable assurance that the EITI data presented comprehensively covers all significant revenues from the extractive sector in Uganda for the year 2021-2022.

Data assurance quality

Extractive entities

Three companies out of the twelve (12) extractive entities that submitted its reporting templates provided signed copies by an authorised officer at management level. The revenues reported by Government Agencies in respect of the eight (8) companies which submitted reporting templates not signed by management, represent 79.92% of the extractive sector's revenues. These are set out as follows:

None of the companies submitted declaration forms certified by an external auditor. By the date of this addendum, only National Cement Company Uganda Limited had submitted its audited financial statements.

Government Agencies

All government agencies submitted declaration forms with the exception of the Uganda Registration Services Bureau (URSB) which submitted partially signed templates.

URA's declaration forms were certified by the Auditor General (AG). DGSM's declaration form of the subnational transfers was not certified by the AG.

Conclusion Data quality and assurance

Except for the matter outlined above, we can conclude with reasonable assurance that the revenues included in this report were subject to credible, independent audit, applying international auditing standards.

1.2 Scope of the Data Collection and Reconciliation

The UGEITI MSG agreed to include in the reconciliation scope the Uganda Revenue Authority (URA) which is a centralised government revenue collection agency responsible for collecting all revenues due to government, including those from extractive entities.

Although this is a significant reduction from the discrepancy reported in the report published in October 2024, it still represents a significant challenge in ensuring compliance with the companies identified in the reconciliation scope. The discrepancy is primarily due to the submission of partially completed declaration forms by companies.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Uganda is endowed with commercial petroleum resources together with a wide variety of valuable mineral deposits. The mineral deposits include gold, marble, copper, graphite, and iron ore, with significant reserves identified. Despite these resources, much of Uganda remains under-explored, presenting vast opportunities for future development. The national ASM strategy aims to formalize small-scale mining, advance large-scale mining, and optimize resource utilization. Uganda joined the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI) in 2020, with the intention of promoting the transparent management of its oil, gas, and mineral resources. EITI in Uganda is overseen by a Multi-Stakeholder Group (MSG) comprising representation from the three constituencies – industry, government and civil society. UGEITI has developed a Strategic Plan for FY 2025/26 – FY 2029/30 to enhance transparency and accountability within the extractive sector.

The Strategic Plan aligns with national priorities and aims to enhance transparency, accountability, and sustainable development in the extractive sector. Developed through extensive stakeholder consultations, the Strategic Plan sets clear objectives and performance indicators for effective implementation, overseen by the MSG and managed by the Uganda Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (UGEITI) Secretariat.

The plan contains insights from SWOT and PESTEL analysis to inform EITI implementation. It consolidates gains from the first four years, addresses challenges, and supports national development and stakeholder needs.

The plan is guided by UGEITI's vision of “a transparent and accountable extractive sector”, and its mission is “to promote information dissemination and public participation for transparency and accountability”. Key values include Professionalism, Integrity, Collaboration, and Transparency.

The plan sets its goal which is to support generation and management of revenues from the extractive sector and use them to create lasting value for the entire nation. The objectives are aligned with the goal and each objective is accompanied by strategies to ensure successful implementation. These objectives include enhancing data disclosure in the extractive sector, facilitating information sharing within the extractive sector, enhancing management of extractive sector revenues and building the operational and technical capacity of the Multi-Stakeholder Group and the Secretariat to effectively implement EITI Standard. While the outcomes include, extractive

industries publicly disclosing EITI data, timeliness in EITI data publication, stakeholders actively participating in information sharing, promptness of revenue reporting and publication among others.

UGEITI has a communication strategy that promotes proactive, responsive communication and sustained resources to ensure inclusive participation in the EITI process, focusing on coordinated internal and external communications and stakeholder relationships. On the other hand, the financing strategy aims for sustainable funding from diverse sources, emphasizing transparent budgeting, regular financial reporting, stakeholder engagement, and leveraging existing systems to enhance effectiveness.

The UGEITI Secretariat will conduct midterm and end-of-term reviews to assess progress and outcomes, while regular monitoring will track key elements such as reporting guidelines, adoption of EITI standards, and impact assessments. The Strategic Plan will be implemented with a total budget of USD 3,081,094 which shall be obtained from funding sources elaborated in the financing strategy.

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background

Uganda is a country with a total estimated population of 45.9 million people¹ covering an area of 241,551 square kilometers where 200,523 square kilometers is land and 41,028 square kilometers is occupied by water bodies. It is located in East Africa, west of Kenya, south of Sudan, east of Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), and North of Rwanda and Tanzania. Whereas the largest part of the country in the south is a lake shore, Uganda is land-locked without access to the sea but it is fertile with many lakes and rivers including the largest lake in Africa called Lake Victoria. The country sits in the heart of the Great - lakes region with Lake Albert and Lake Edward located in its western border. The fertile land and numerous lakes and rivers make Uganda a unique and vibrant country in the heart of the Great Lakes region.

The mining industry in Uganda dates back to the 1920's with initial work focused on tin and tungsten deposits in southwest Uganda. The 1950's marked a significant boom with mining contributing up to 30% of Uganda's export earnings. The Kilembe copper mine developed during this period became the country's largest mine with estimated deposits of over 4 million tonnes of copper and an undetermined amount of cobalt ore. The mine was initially developed by Canadian companies in the 1950s and later acquired by the Ugandan government in 1975.²

Over time the country has witnessed growth of the subsector. In 2001, government strengthened the legal framework by developing the Mining Policy of 2001. In 2003 the Mining Act was also developed. As a result, there has been observed increase in investment in the subsector, new mines coming on-stream, growing mineral discoveries, as well as increase in mineral trade especially in gold and iron. The government has further introduced reforms by developing the Mining and Mineral Policy 2018 and the Mining and Minerals Act 2022. The sector presents strong potential to generate substantial revenue and employment and provide more visible economic benefits to the country (up to 5% GDP) and improved livelihood for the population.³

In addition to mining, Uganda has also been developing her petroleum potential. In 1925, the government of Uganda documented the existence of oil seepages along the shores of Lake Albert. This was followed by a series of exploration activities, and in 2006 Tullow Uganda Operations Pty (Tullow) made the first commercial petroleum discovery in the Kaiso Tonya area. To date, Uganda has confirmed 6.5 billion barrels of oil resources, with 1.6 billion barrels⁴ considered economically recoverable. The sector has since expanded from exploration to the development phase.

1.2 The Extractive Industry Transparency Initiative (EITI)

The EITI is a global initiative that promotes the open and accountable management of oil, gas and mineral resources. The 2023 EITI Standard introduces requirements that aim to increase public understanding about the impact of energy transition on the oil, gas and mining sectors, and to inform policy decisions. It upholds transparency in payments and revenue receipts from the extractive sector, which ultimately leads to a demand for accountability in the management of revenue from those resources. The EITI therefore requires member countries to develop strategies to engage in emerging issues which include among others contract transparency, beneficial ownership, fiscal modeling, gender mainstreaming, environment, energy transition, social impact, and openness in extractives. With over 50 implementing member countries, EITI believes that resource-rich countries can employ data and dialogue to facilitate accountable decision-making within a dynamic industry.

Uganda officially became a member of the EITI in August 2020. This was after successfully being approved by the EITI Board which comprises representatives from extractive companies, investors, international civil society organizations, and governments of supporting countries. The basis for Uganda's admission to the EITI was the submission of a candidacy application, which detailed the country's statement of intent for improving the governance of its extractive sector as documented in the Uganda EITI National Work-plan 2020 – 2022, which had three objectives stated as follows:

- To enhance transparency in the extractive sector to promote good governance and accountability in the management of extractive revenues;
- To strengthen revenue management and accountability with a view to ensuring effective collection, optimization and allocation of revenues; and

- To build the operational and technical capacity of the Multi-Stakeholder Group (MSG) and the Secretariat to ensure that EITI is effectively implemented.

The Multi-Stakeholder Group (MSG) oversees the implementation of the EITI in Uganda. It has representatives from three constituencies, civil society, extractive companies and Government. The MSG is supported by a Secretariat (UGEITI) which undertakes the implementation of EITI activities on a day-to-day basis.

1.3. Alignment with national and international frameworks

This Strategic Plan has been developed in alignment with both national and international planning and compliance frameworks.

1.3.1 Fourth National Development Plan FY 2025/26 - FY 2029/30 (NDP IV)

The UGEITI Strategic Plan has been developed based on national priorities outlined in the fourth National Development Plan (NDP IV) that was approved by Cabinet in March 2024 and shall be implemented starting July 2025. When implemented the plan shall contribute to achievement of some of these priorities.

The goal of the NDP IV is to “Achieve higher household incomes, full monetization of the economy, and employment for sustainable socio-economic transformation”. This goal will be achieved under the theme “Sustainable Industrialization for Inclusive Growth, Employment, and Wealth Creation”. In pursuit of the goal, the NDP IV is focused on exploiting high-impact growth areas that will propel a double-digit growth over the NDP IV period and subsequently contribute to 10-fold growth of the economy over the 15 years leading up to 2040.

Among the key areas earmarked for growth are mineral extraction, the burgeoning oil and gas industry, and the development of a robust tourism sector. This Strategic Plan therefore aligns with the said growth areas by focusing on effective generation of revenues and their prudent management and utilization.

In light of the necessity to diversify energy sources and technologies for high-tech companies and automotive manufacturers, the NDPIV intends to boost mineral production and enhance productivity of the country’s mineral resources to drive job-rich industrialization. This Strategic Plan will contribute to the above strategy by promoting transparency and accountability within the extractive sector, hence playing a pivotal role in advancing the national agenda.

1.3.3 Data protection policy⁵

In 2009 the National Information Technology Authority – Uganda (NITA-U) was established under the NITA-U Act. NITA-U is the agency responsible for enforcing laws that govern information and communication technology in Uganda. Its mandate is to coordinate, promote, and monitor information Technology (IT) developments in Uganda within the context of National social economic development.

On March 1st, 2019, the Data Protection and Privacy Act, 2019 came into force in Uganda and the Regulations, 2021 were issued in May 2021, to implement the Act. The Data Protection and Privacy Act and the Regulations are intended to support privacy protections which are already guaranteed to Ugandans under the Constitution of the Republic of Uganda 1995⁶, and further to complement sectorial laws for regulated activities that had previously incorporated data protection provisions. The Act focuses on the protection of privacy and personal data through regulation of data collection, processing, storage, and dissemination of personal information especially in the digital world.

This Strategic Plan therefore promotes data protection whilst fostering transparency and accountability in the extractive sector.

1.3.4 Domestic Revenue Mobilization Strategy (DRMS) for Uganda 2019/20-2023/24⁷

The core objective of this strategy is to improve revenue collection, lifting Uganda's tax-to-GDP ratio to between 18-20% within the next five financial years. The DRMS sets out medium-term objectives for the revenue system and a revenue mobilization target, established through broad-based consensus. The DRMS adopts an approach of identifying key weaknesses and areas of untapped potential, followed by detailed reforms to address these over the five-year DRMS period.

This Strategic Plan sets out to contribute to the effectiveness of the DRMS by fostering deliberate efforts in ensuring scrutiny of the revenues generated from the extractive sector.

1.3.5 National oil & gas policy 2008⁸

The effort to promote Uganda's oil and gas potential has led to intensified exploration work being undertaken in the Albertine Graben. This culminated in the confirmation of the existence of commercial reserves of oil in the country during 2006. It is now apparent that petroleum will be produced in the country. This occasioned the formulation of a National Oil and Gas Policy (2008) to address the entire spectrum of exploration, development and production of the country's oil and gas resources in a more comprehensive manner.

Among the objectives of the policy is ensuring collection of the right revenues and use them to create lasting value for the entire nation, ensuring that oil and gas activities are undertaken in a manner that conserves the environment and biodiversity and ensuring mutually beneficial relationships between all stakeholders in the development of a desirable oil and gas sector for the country.

This Strategic Plan is therefore consistent with the said objectives in as far as the scrutiny of revenues accruing from oil and gas activities.

1.3.6 Oil and Gas Revenue Management Policy 2012

The objective of this policy is to ensure that oil and gas revenues are managed in a way that promotes sustainable economic and social transformation. This involves ensuring that the management of oil and gas revenues adheres to the highest standards of transparency and accountability, mitigating the potential negative impacts of oil and gas revenues on the macroeconomic, budgetary, and governance structures and encouraging other sources of wealth creation to sustain economic and social transformation beyond the oil and gas era.

This Strategic Plan therefore aligns with the necessary interventions by formulating the necessary integration that promotes effective revenue management.

1.3.7 The Energy Transition Plan 2023⁹

The Energy Transition Plan 2023 is a strategic roadmap aimed at transforming Uganda's energy sector. Developed by the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Development with support from the International Energy Agency, the plan focuses on achieving universal access to modern energy and powering Uganda's economic transformation sustainably and securely.

The key aspects in this plan include; ensuring all citizens have access to modern energy, promoting the use of renewable energy sources, leveraging Uganda's energy resources for economic growth and reducing carbon emissions and aiming for net-zero energy sector by 2050.

This Strategic Plan will therefore contribute to the above aspects by key interventions including bringing together key players in the energy industry to enhance dialogue regarding future direction on energy transition.

1.3.8 The Mining and Mineral Policy 2018¹⁰

The Mining and Mineral Policy (2018) was developed to address the following issues: legal and regulatory framework, management of ASM, effective environmental management, health and safety, financing, market, value addition, institutional capacity, emerging issues, effective development of the mining industry, improving the investment climate, improved governance in the mining industry that calls for expedited review and development of policies and legislation relating to mineral development in Uganda, strategies that maximize social and economic benefits without compromising environmental sustainability for the benefit of present and future generations, harmonizing National and regional policies and strategies related to the development and exploitation of mineral resources, regulating the commercial exploitation of low value minerals.

This Strategic plan will support in harmonizing the national and regional policies, improve governance, and regulate the exploitation of minerals hence contributing directly to the goals outlined in the Mining and Mineral Policy, ultimately benefiting both current and future generations.

1.4 Rationale

The rationale for the SP is based on the need to define strategic direction for Uganda's EITI activities for the next five years. The Plan provides a roadmap, defines objectives, priorities, strategies and actions over a period of five years. The Strategic Plan will facilitate EITI implementation in Uganda. The new EITI Standard 2023 introduces requirements that aim to increase public understanding about the impact of energy transition on the oil, gas and mining sectors to inform policy making. It also seeks to address corruption risks, improve revenue collection and promote gender equity. Therefore, the UGEITI Strategic Plan (2025/26 -2029/30) will help to align Uganda's EITI initiatives with international standards and best practices, which not only reinforce the

commitment to transparency but also enhance the country's reputation in the global community.

The Strategic Plan will support Uganda to comply with key commitments to disclosing information about the extraction and management of natural resources, including payments and receipts.

1.5 Process of Developing the Strategic Plan

The Strategic Plan development was a collaborative process that involved engaging stakeholders such as the UGEITI Secretariat, government entities, extractive industries, and civil society organizations (CSOs). The goal was to secure participative contributions, enhance ownership, and reach consensus on key issues, ensuring the plan's acceptability and ease of implementation for the period of July 2025 to June 2030.

The process included reviewing various documents like UGEITI annual reports, EITI tools, implementation guidelines, strategic plans of other EITI members among others. This helped to assess UGEITI's progress, benchmark from other implementers, assess the environment, establish a baseline, and identify gaps for the Strategic Plan implementation period (2025/26 - 2029/30).

An institutional assessment identified internal gaps and proposed strategies to build UGEITI's capacity. A SWOT analysis updated UGEITI's Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats. The external environment was assessed using the PESTEL analysis to understand factors impacting the implementation and performance of EITI in Uganda and determine their significance for the next five years.

1.6 Structure of the Strategic Plan document.

The Strategic Plan has been structured in four broad sections: the first section presents the historical background of the extractive industry, The EITI, aligning with National and international frameworks, rationale, process and structure of the Strategic Plan. The second section presents the policy, legal and institutional framework, status of the extractive sector in Uganda, progress of EITI implementation and contextual analysis. The third section defines the direction that is Vision, mission, values, objectives and strategies to be used when implementing the Strategic Plan. Lastly, it presents the budget that will facilitate successful implementation, theory of change and monitoring and evaluation framework to enable effective tracking of progress while implementing the Strategic Plan.

2. SITUATION ANALYSIS

2.1 Policy and Legal Framework

The government of Uganda has developed different policies and legal framework to govern her oil and gas sector. These include the following;

2.2 Institutional Framework

The Uganda Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (UGEITI) is governed by a robust institutional framework designed to promote transparency and accountability in the extractive sector.

The Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development (MoFPED) provides the necessary institutional framework and support for Uganda's EITI membership. The Minister of Finance, Planning and Economic Development appoints the EITI MSG members through a consultative process. The MSG is comprised representatives from three stakeholder constituencies: Government, extractive companies, and Civil Society Organizations. It is responsible for overseeing the implementation of EITI in Uganda and is supported by the UGEITI Secretariat. The Secretariat coordinates EITI implementation on a day-to-day basis.

The International EITI Secretariat offers guidance and validation to ensure Uganda's compliance with the EITI standards.

Besides the Ministry of Finance, the following institutions play a critical role in the implementation of EITI in Uganda through availability of data and sharing valuable information:

- a. The Ministry of Energy and Mineral Development (MEMD) oversees the development of policy and licensing of the energy and mineral sectors, including oil and gas.
- b. Petroleum Authority of Uganda is responsible for the regulation and monitoring of petroleum activities in the country.
- c. National Environment Management Authority (NEMA) ensures that environmental standards are met in the mining, oil, and gas sectors.
- d. Uganda Revenue Authority manages the collection of taxes and royalties from the extractive industries.

In addition to the above outlined structures, Government has other ministries, departments and agencies that are relevant in the management of the extractive sector. These include: Ministry of Water and Environment; Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs; Ministry of Local Government; Ministry of Gender, Labor and Social Development; Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Ministry of Lands Housing and Urban Development. Other government entities that play a role in the extractive sector include: Parliament, Bank of Uganda, Office of the Auditor General, and Uganda Registration Services Bureau.

This legal and institutional framework provides an enabling environment for implementation of EITI and sustainable development of Uganda's extractive sector.

2.3 Status of the Extractive sector in Uganda

a. Oil and gas sector¹¹

Uganda made commercial oil and gas discoveries in 2006. To-date, the total confirmed Stock Tank Oil Initially in Place (STOIIP) in the Albertine Graben is 6.5 billion barrels, of which 1.4 billion barrels is estimated to be recoverable. The sector has progressed to the development phase with a focus on two upstream projects namely, Tilenga and Kingfisher and two midstream projects namely, EACOP and the oil refinery.

In an effort to further the investment in oil and gas exploration to increase the resource base, the Government is planning to open up three (3) basins for petroleum activities. These are basins, which all lie outside of the Albertine Graben and include the following: i) Lake Kyoga Basin – 3,044 km², ii) Hoima Basin – 3,728 km² and iii) Moroto-Kadam Basin – 7,815 km². The opening up of the new areas (frontier basins) involves undertaking impact assessments to determine how the proposed petroleum activities will affect the environment, tourism, and trade; and contribute to socio-economic development.

b. Mining sector

Uganda is endowed with a wealth of minerals, including: gold, cobalt, graphite, iron, marble, limestone, copper, tin, and other rare earth elements. Endowed with over 50 different types of minerals, Uganda ranks among African countries with the most significant number of minerals. This diverse range of mineral resources presents an excellent opportunity for benefits that can contribute significantly to the country's economic growth. However, the exact potential for viable exploitation has not yet been established for most of them (UNECA, 2023). Recent years have seen a surge in exploration activity, fueled by rising global demand for these minerals. For decades, Uganda's mining sub-sector has seen both progress and obstacles. The sub-sector has undergone significant transformations in recent years, driven by domestic and international factors. Uganda has established a rich legal and policy framework for managing mineral resources. The policy and legal regime stems from the Constitution of the Republic of Uganda, 1995 (as amended), which vests the ownership and control of natural resources in the hands of the people¹². The enactment of the Mining and Mineral Act in 2022 represents a pivotal moment in the country's efforts to

harness its mineral wealth while ensuring sustainable and responsible extraction practices.¹³

The third National Development Plan (2021-2025) also highlights Mineral Development as one of the critical program areas to increase mineral exploitation and value addition in selected resources for quality and gainful jobs in industrialization. The Third National Development Plan (NDP III) separated mining from oil and gas, giving the sub-sector special attention to the government and projecting its contribution to the GDP to surpass 10%. Chapter 6 of the NDP 111 provides a planning framework for the Mineral Development Program. The Focus of Mineral Development over the NDP 111 period (2021-2025) is to build on existing investments along the value chains and address the challenges limiting the realization of the full potential of minerals.

The sub-sector is still challenged by low funding, limited institutional capacity to manage the mineral resources, value addition to minerals, the complex nature of artisanal and small-scale mining, conflicts and environmental degradation. The mining sector is largely informal and dominated by artisanal and small-scale miners. These miners largely use rudimentary tools to extract minerals and are often involved in illegal mining. The envisioned development of upcoming projects such as the Sukulu Phosphate Project, the Kilembe Copper Mines, the Iron and steel industry, the Alupe gold project and marble resources in Karamoja necessitates a more strategic management framework for minerals in Uganda (MEMD, 2018).

2.4 Progress of EITI implementation

2.4.1. UGEITI's performance in implementing the 2019 EITI Standard.

In its third year of EITI implementation, Uganda underwent validation by the EITI International Secretariat and scored 78.5% which is ranked as moderate.

Validation is the assessment process that EITI member countries undergo to evaluate the success of their implementation process against the EITI Standard. The final validation score is a consolidation of the three component scores – outcomes and impact, stakeholder engagement and transparency - that are combined to provide the overall score. Whereas Uganda scored fairly highly on the first two components, on the transparency component, a fairly low score of 67.5 was achieved. Uganda was commended for having a robust multi-stakeholder platform that facilitated public engagement and data - driven debate.

It was also encouraged to improve its transparency score by enabling contract and full beneficial ownership disclosure for extractive companies.

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2.5 Contextual Analysis.

This section provides a holistic analysis of the UGEITI operational environment. It highlights the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (SWOT) underlying the implementation of EITI in Uganda, as well as analyzing the political, economic, social, technological, environmental and legal (PESTEL) environment. The same section also identifies partners and stakeholders of UGEITI plus their needs, concerns and interests, categorized according to their level of influence.

2.5.1 The SWOT Analysis

The SWOT analysis examines the existing strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats regarding UGEITI.

2.5.2 PESTEL Analysis

The Political, Economic, Social, Technological, Environmental and Legal (PESTEL) analysis provides an outlook of the external environment where UGEITI has been operating since inception. It has been used in this Strategic Plan document to explain how the external environment influences the implementation of EITI in Uganda in those aspects.

2.5.2.1 Political Context

Uganda's political stability, supported by a strong Presidential leadership, demonstrates the political will to implement EITI. The legislative framework, with an active Parliament, ensures that policies are effectively enacted, promoting transparency and accountability. Judicial independence upholds the rule of law and guarantees justice, further enhancing the integrity of the EITI process.

Additionally, the well-established security apparatus, including the military and police forces, plays a crucial role in maintaining internal stability and order, further reinforcing the country's commitment to transparency and accountability in the extractive industries. This stable and secure environment creates a conducive atmosphere for investment, attracting both local and international investors to Uganda's extractive sector.

The strong government support can significantly enhance the implementation of transparency measures in the extractive sector, ensuring that UGEITI's initiatives are effectively supported and executed. Additionally, changes in laws and regulations related to the extractive industries can have a profound impact on UGEITI's operations and objectives, necessitating adaptability and responsiveness to maintain alignment with evolving legal frameworks. The prevailing political stability in the country also fosters consistent application of transparency and accountability measures, as it provides a stable environment for UGEITI to operate and achieve its goals without disruptions.

2.5.2.2 Economic Context

Regarding the economic environment, the discovery of oil in Uganda offers a remarkable opportunity to transform the nation's economy through infrastructure development and poverty alleviation. With oil expected to contribute an average of US\$2 billion annually—approximately 10% of GDP—for at least 26 years, this substantial revenue influx can be strategically invested in critical infrastructure projects. Such investments can drive economic growth and significantly enhance the quality of life for many Ugandans. However, to fully realize these benefits, it is essential to manage these resources with transparency and efficiency. Ensuring that the benefits of oil wealth are equitably distributed

will be key to achieving sustainable development and long-term economic stability. This shall be possible with adoption of an optimal fiscal regime.

The current fiscal regime for the petroleum sector in Uganda is based on the Production Sharing Agreement (PSA) where oil companies are contracted by the government. The fiscal provisions of a PSA constitute four main components namely; royalties (payments made to government based on the volume or value of oil produced), cost recovery oil (oil allocated to companies to recover their exploration and production costs), profit oil (the remaining oil after oil recovery which is shared between the government and the oil companies), and income tax (taxes levied on the profits of the oil companies). This structure ensures that both government and the oil companies benefit from the extraction activities while also providing a mechanism for cost recovery and profit sharing.

Therefore, the link between Uganda's oil revenue and its fiscal regime is crucial for ensuring that the economic benefits are maximized and equitably distributed. The fiscal regime determines how oil revenues are collected through taxes, royalties, and other financial mechanisms. It also outlines how collected revenues are allocated to various sectors, including infrastructure development, healthcare, education, and social services.

Uganda offers a range of subsidies and tax holidays to attract foreign investors. Some of these incentives and subsidies may include; tax holidays, investment allowance, VAT deferral, foreign tax credit, customs duty exemptions, employment incentives, sector- specific support among others. These incentives aim to create a competitive investment climate and attract foreign capital to drive economic growth and development in Uganda

2.5.2.3 Social and Demographic context

The social characteristics defining Uganda are compounded by the historical factors that affected human settlement in the early years. The people in Uganda include the Bantu speakers, Nilotic, Hamites and Nilo-Hamites who settled in the country many years ago. The various tribes and culture are determined and sometimes demarcated by the nature of physical features. Lake Kyoga for example roughly serves as a boundary between Bantu speakers in the South and the Nilotic and Central Sudanese language speakers to the north.

Regarding demographic characteristics, Uganda's population stands at approximately 45.9 million people with a growth rate of 2.8%¹⁴, while the

population density is 277 people per square kilometer. The female population makes up a larger portion, with 23,440,016 females compared to 22,495,030 males. This results in a sex ratio of 96 males for every 100 females.¹⁵ From a gender perspective, it is essential to address the unique needs and challenges faced by different groups. For instance, young women and girls often face barriers to education and employment, which can limit their opportunities for economic participation. The integration of gender-sensitive practices within Uganda's extractive industries is crucial for fostering equitable development. The Ministry of Gender, Labour, and Social Development, along with UGEITI, plays a pivotal role in ensuring that gender inclusivity is embedded in all aspects of the sector. By adhering to the guidelines set forth by the EITI International Secretariat, Uganda can address the socio-economic disparities that affect access to resources and decision-making power among different genders.

A holistic approach that prioritizes the inclusion and empowerment of women is essential to enhancing the social fabric by promoting equal opportunities for all stakeholders. UGEITI shall collaborate with the Ministry of Gender, Labour, and Social Development to ensure that gender inclusivity is integrated into all aspects of the extractive sector.

ASM operations are often informal, lacking the necessary licenses and permits required by law. This informality means that ASM activities are not captured in official government revenues, leading to a significant gap in reporting. The informal nature of ASM also makes it difficult to regulate and monitor, resulting in unregistered production and potential revenue loss.

To ensure sustainable and equitable growth in Uganda's extractive industries, it is crucial to address both the formalization of artisanal and small-scale mining (ASM) and the integration of gender-sensitive practices. By formalizing ASM through comprehensive legal, regulatory, and policy frameworks, Uganda can enhance transparency, accountability, and accurate reporting, thereby maximizing the sector's economic contributions. Additionally, embedding gender inclusivity within these frameworks, as championed by the Ministry of Gender, Labour, and Social Development and UGEITI, will empower women and ensure that all genders have equal opportunities and support in the extractive industries.

2.5.2.4 Technological Context

Information and Communication Technology Advancement

Advancement of Information Communication Technology (ICT) both within the country and worldwide has facilitated the development of online communication, transactions, and online monitoring of both public and private sectors, amongst other developments. Technology has also made it easy to store and manage information and databases regarding the population and other bodies and corporate organizations. There is easy communication exchange especially with the outside world. Most organizations and companies have adopted online and electronic management information systems, making it easy to communicate, store and share information.

There are other various technologies in the mining sector and these may include the following;

- The introduction of automated and remote-controlled machinery in the mining sector has enhanced safety and productivity. This technology reduces the need for human presence in hazardous environments¹.
- Advanced Monitoring Systems: The use of IoT, machine learning, and real-time monitoring systems helps optimize operations and predict equipment failures, improving overall efficiency.
- Long wall and Continuous Mining Technologies: These methods allow for more efficient extraction of minerals from complex deposits, reducing operational costs and increasing safety.
- Renewable Energy Integration: Uganda's extractive sector is transitioning to renewable energy sources, such as solar and wind power, to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.
- On-Site Power Generation: On-site renewable energy generation, including solar and wind power, helps reduce reliance on fossil fuels and lowers emissions.
- Carbon Capture and Storage (CCS): Some mining companies in Uganda are exploring CCS technologies to capture and store carbon dioxide emissions from their operations.

2.5.2.5 Environmental Context

The National Environment Management Act 2019, is responsible for coordinating, monitoring, regulating, and supervising environmental management across all sectors, including extractives. This involves conducting environmental impact assessments (EIAs), monitoring compliance, regulating the impact of toxins, and ensuring that national performance standards align with international environmental sustainability standards. Other key agencies, such as the Directorate of Water Resources Management, the Ministry of Energy

& Mineral Development, and the Petroleum Authority of Uganda, also play significant roles in environmental regulation and monitoring.

Extractive companies are required to commission Environmental Impact Assessments (EIA), as well as environmental mitigation plans. In accordance with the provisions in Sections 10-11 of the National Environment Act No.5 of 2019, NEMA is required to consult closely with the relevant Lead Agencies in the review of Environmental and Social Impact Statements (ESIS) or Project Briefs (PBs). EIA reports submitted to NEMA are forwarded to the key Lead Agency(ies) to ascertain acceptability of the development and ensure that the information/assessment contained in the report is satisfactory in relation to the mitigation or management of environmental impacts (if any) that are associated with the development. The Lead Agencies often undertake independent verification of the content of EIA reports.

EITI implementation can be affected both positively and negatively by the environmental context. On the positive side, the stringent environmental regulations and the active role of NEMA and other agencies ensures that extractive activities are closely monitored, reducing the risk of environmental degradation. Additionally, the environmental impacts of extractive activities, such as habitat fragmentation, soil erosion, and waste generation, can create social and environmental concerns that need to be addressed through effective mitigation strategies.

2.5.2.6 Legal Context

In Uganda, the Investment Code Act 2019 is the primary legal framework governing foreign investment. This Act establishes the Uganda Investment Authority (UIA), which is responsible for promoting and facilitating investment in the country. The UIA operates a one-stop center to streamline the process of business registration and licensing for foreign investors.

Contracts in Uganda's oil and gas sector are crucial for regulating the exploration, development, and production of petroleum resources. There are various types of contracts including; Service Contracts (SCs), Joint Ventures (JVs), Production Sharing Agreements (PSAs), Unitization Agreements, and Concessions

It is therefore important to note that Uganda's investment landscape is guided by comprehensive legal frameworks aimed at fostering a favorable environment for foreign investors while ensuring that the country's natural resources are managed sustainably. The Investment Code Act 2019 empowers the Uganda Investment Authority to facilitate and streamline foreign investments, while

various contractual arrangements in the oil and gas sector regulate resource exploration and production. Additionally, the 1995 Constitution under Article 244 reinforces government oversight and equitable resource distribution, ensuring that mineral exploitation benefits the nation. Together, these frameworks create a balanced approach to attracting investment and protecting national interests.

2.5.3 Stakeholder Analysis

Stakeholders in this context have been defined as individuals, organizations and government bodies/ institutions that influence UGEITI's implementation. The stakeholder analysis has been generated to establish the nature and level of influence of stakeholders and how their actions or non-actions may impact positively or negatively on the implementation of EITI in Uganda. Therefore, the Stakeholder Analysis (SHA) shall facilitate the strategy development and extent to which we shall engage the stakeholders during the implementation of the Strategic Plan.

3. STRATEGIC DIRECTION FY 2025/26 – 2029/30

The UGEITI Strategic Plan is aligned to the national priorities stated in Section One of this document in order to contribute to the achievement of the country's set targets. The plan also considers the SWOT and PESTEL contextual aspects and the recommendations drawn from the previous experiences of the first three years of implementing EITI in Uganda.

In order to strengthen the implementation of the EITI initiative and to consolidate the gains registered in the first three years of implementing the initiative, and to address the challenges encountered and effectively contribute to the national development plan and the needs of stakeholders, UGEITI has defined its future direction by coming up with a vision, mission, values, pillars, objectives and strategies.

3.1 Vision, Mission and Values

The vision, mission and values statements of UGEITI are articulated under this section. They reflect UGEITI's desired future state of being; define EITI's fundamental purpose in Uganda and for its continuity.

On the other hand, the section of values outlines the standards that UGEITI upholds in its execution of the overall objectives in order to live up to the expectations of the clients, stakeholders and the entire country at large.

The strategies are responsive to the emerging issues around extractive sector governance which include limited data disclosure, beneficial ownership disclosure, and energy transition.

Objective 1

To enhance data disclosure in the extractive sector.

Strategies

- Ensure regular and timely publication of EITI data.
- Establish partnerships and collaboration among relevant stakeholders.
- Establish ICT systems and infrastructure relevant for data disclosure.
- Promote engagements among civil society, government, and extractive companies.
- Advocate for data disclosure policies within the extractive sector.

Objective 2

To facilitate information sharing within the extractive sector.

Strategies

- Establish platforms for regular information exchange.
- Adapt and utilize the latest technology and innovative solutions.
- Establish collaboration with the media.
- Establish and maintain a framework for information dissemination.

Objective 3

To enhance management of extractive sector revenues.

Strategies.

- Promote inter-institutional coordination for revenue management.
- Promote public access to extractive sector revenue information.
- Create awareness on revenue potential in the extractive sector.
- Advocate for strong revenue management policies in the extractive sector.

Objective 4

To build the operational and technical capacity of the Multi-Stakeholder Group (MSG) and the Secretariat to effectively implement EITI Standards.

Strategies

- Conduct research in management of the extractive industries.
- Put in place a learning and skills development program for the MSG and Secretariat members.
- Establish strategic partnerships with EITI member countries and development partners.
- Establish and implement strategies to mobilize funding.

4. COMMUNICATION PLAN

UGEITI's communication strategy spells out the core principles of EITI communication as;

- Proactive and responsive communication is critical to the success of the national EITI work plan, and is crucial as a means of ensuring informed and inclusive participation in the EITI process and deliberations.

- Effective communication requires sustained commitment and action including the allocation of appropriate and adequate human, financial, and material resources.
- It is important to identify the relevant stakeholders, to define from the outset their expectations, to determine how they can engage in the EITI process, and to specify the means by which they might most effectively be communicated with or reached.
- Open feedback is essential to enable stakeholders to let the managers of the EITI programme know what they think. The EITI programme and its managers should be publicly accessible and upfront about what they will do with the feedback received from the public and stakeholders.

Therefore the mandate of the Communication Function is to: Coordinate communication internally within the UGEITI Secretariat, MSG, the MOFPED, and counterpart government ministries and agencies; Gather and disseminate information about the extractives sector locally, nationally and internationally; Build and sustain relationships with EI stakeholders at the community, national, and international levels; Implement the UGEITI communication strategy and ensure it is regularly updated and aligned with the UGEITI national work plan and Synchronize the UGEITI's communication priorities with the GOU communication objectives and constitutional obligations of citizens' access to information.

5. FINANCING STRATEGY

UGEITI's financing strategy is designed to ensure sustainable and effective funding to support its activities and objectives. This strategy involves securing financial resources from a mix of domestic and international sources, including government allocations, donor contributions, and partnerships with private sector entities. Key elements of the strategy include:

1. **Diversified Funding Sources:** UGEITI aims to diversify its funding sources to reduce dependency on any single source. This includes seeking support from international donors, development partners, and private sector stakeholders involved in the extractive industries, in addition to government funding.
2. **Efficient Financial Management:** The strategy emphasizes the importance of efficient financial management practices. This includes transparent budgeting, regular financial reporting, and stringent auditing processes to ensure accountability and proper use of funds.

3. **Capacity Building:** Strengthening the financial management capacity of the UGEITI secretariat and its stakeholders is a priority. This shall involve training and resources to enhance skills in financial planning, management, and reporting.
4. **Leveraging Existing Systems:** UGEITI plans to utilize existing financial systems and tools to streamline operations and improve efficiency. This includes integrating financial management systems with monitoring and evaluation frameworks to ensure effective tracking of expenditures and outcomes.
5. **Stakeholder Engagement:** Engaging with stakeholders to secure their financial and in-kind support is crucial. This includes building partnerships with extractive companies, civil society organizations, and other relevant entities to foster a collaborative approach to funding.

By implementing this comprehensive financing strategy, UGEITI aims to address funding gaps, enhance its operational effectiveness, and ensure the successful implementation of EITI standards in Uganda.¹⁶

MONITORING AND EVALUATION FRAMEWORK

Overview of the Monitoring and Evaluation Framework

The Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) framework is designed to strengthen UGEITI's ability to use evidence for decision-making in governance, programming, and reporting. This framework will guide the monitoring and evaluation of the Strategic Plan 2025/26-2029/30.

Implementation: The M&E activities will be conducted by the UGEITI secretariat. Baseline data, derived from environmental analysis and relevant documents such as annual reports, will serve as the starting point for measuring the progress of the Strategic Plan.

Mid-term and End-of-term reviews: A mid-term review will be conducted to assess whether the Strategic Plan is on track to achieve its objectives. At the end of the implementation period, an end-of-term evaluation will be carried out to evaluate the outcomes and impacts of each focus area.

Data Sources: The M&E framework will utilize both primary and secondary information. Primary data will be collected from the secretariat, partners, and key stakeholders, including extractive industries and government entities like the Uganda Revenue Authority, while secondary data will come from pre-analyzed and recorded sources such as reports, studies, and research conducted internally by UGEITI or by other entities like the Uganda Bureau of Statistics, National Planning Authority, and the International EITI secretariat.

Continuous Monitoring: Progress will be monitored regularly, starting from data generation in the extractive industries, through the secretariat, and up to the International EITI office.

Key Elements to be Monitored and Evaluated

1. **Availability of Reporting Guidelines and Templates** to ensure that stakeholders have access to the necessary reporting guidelines and templates.
2. **Evidence of Outputs:** Monitor the outputs of implemented activities, focusing on quality, quantity, and the level of involvement of planned stakeholders.
3. **Adoption of EITI Standards:** Track the progress of stakeholders in adopting the EITI standards.
4. **Report generation and dissemination:** Verify the generation and dissemination of reports to relevant stakeholders.
5. **Changes to the Strategic Plan:** Document any changes, omissions, deletions, or additions to planned activities or the entire Strategic Plan.

6. **Impact Assessment:** Evaluate the positive or negative impacts realized as a result of implementing the Strategic Plan.
7. **Regular Template Filling:** Ensure that templates are filled regularly to facilitate the annual compilation of reports.

Key Elements to be evaluated

Both mid-term and end-of-term evaluations will be based on the Strategic Plan change matrix/M&E Matrix and the strategies set out for implementation. The evaluation will focus on:

1. **Achievement of Objectives:** Assess the extent to which the set objectives or targets have been achieved.
2. **Appropriateness of Strategies:** Evaluate the strategies employed and their effectiveness in attaining the outcomes of the Strategic Plan.
3. **Alternative Strategies:** Identify possible alternative strategies that could be more effective and efficient in achieving the same objectives.
4. **Impact Assessment:** Examine both anticipated and unanticipated effects of UGEITI implementation, particularly regarding environmental impact and gender equality issues.

Gender equality will be assessed during the evaluation by focusing on several key aspects:

1. **Participation and representation:** We shall evaluate the level of participation and representation of different genders in the activities and decision-making processes of UGEITI at all levels, including governance and key stakeholders
2. **Access to resources and opportunities:** Assess whether all genders have equal access to resources, opportunities, and benefits provided by the Strategic Plan.
3. **Impact on Gender Equality:** Examine the specific impacts of the Strategic Plan on gender equality, including any positive or negative changes in gender dynamics.
4. **Inclusion of Gender-Sensitive Indicators:** the strategic plan M&E framework takes into account gender-sensitive indicators to track progress and outcomes related to gender equality.
5. **Feedback from Stakeholders:** Collect and analyze feedback from stakeholders, including women and gender-focused groups, to understand their perspectives on gender equality within the implementation of the Strategic Plan.

These assessments will help ensure that gender equality is effectively integrated and promoted throughout the implementation and evaluation of the Strategic Plan.

Annex I11: Assessment of risks

In this context, risks refer to the potential challenges, uncertainties, and external factors that could hinder the successful implementation of EITI in the country. Risks are events or conditions that have the potential to disrupt the expected causal pathways within the Theory of Change and prevent the desired outcomes from being achieved.

Identifying and addressing risks in a theory of change is essential for developing a comprehensive and realistic understanding of the initiative's context and potential obstacles. By acknowledging and analyzing risks, UGEITI secretariat can better plan for contingencies, adjust strategies, and mitigate potential negative impacts. This proactive approach will help to enhance the EITI's resilience and increase the likelihood of achieving its intended outcome in Uganda.

The following risks have been identified and the mitigation measures for each.
