MIN 1.0: WELCOME, OPENING PRAYER AND INTRODUCTIONS

- 1.1 The moderator welcomed all participants and invited the representative from NEMA to lead the opening prayer.

MIN 2.0: ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

- 2.1 The meeting Agenda was reviewed and adopted.

MIN 3.0: COMMUNICATION FROM THE CHAIR

- 3.1 The Chairperson welcomed all members to the 40th MSG meeting. He thanked members for their active participation during the MSG induction and congratulated them on their appointment to represent their constituencies on the Multi-Stakeholder Group of UGEITI. He

noted that it is a valuable opportunity to serve the country. He thanked the outgoing MSG members led by Mr. Moses Kaggwa for the great work so far. He pointed out that the outgoing MSG members had attained commendable achievements during their tenure and pledged that the new MSG members would build on them. He also commended both the EITI International Secretariat and the National Secretariat for their role in supporting these accomplishments.

- 3.2 The Chairperson noted that many oil-producing countries face significant challenges, where natural resources usually result in the resource curse. He explained that the establishment of EITI was intended to strengthen governance in the extractive sector to ensure the effective and transparent management of extractive revenues. He stated that the country has the capacity to implement the EITI Standard effectively, provided all stakeholders uphold the principles of accountability and transparency. In this regard, he urged the MSG to actively follow up on recommendations from EITI reports.
- 3.3 He pointed out that inadequate financing was a challenge across all sectors and encouraged the MSG to engage in discussions and adopt innovative approaches for resource mobilisation.
- 3.4 The Chairperson also highlighted the need to build the capacity of both the MSG and the National Secretariat to enable them undertake more technical analysis including research and data analysis.
- 3.5 He noted that the country was implementing the Fourth National Development Plan (NDP IV) and called upon members to reflect on how to effectively contribute to achievement of UGEITI's outputs in line with the relevant national development programmes.
- 3.6 He further advised the Secretariat to share meeting documents with MSG members at least 14 days in advance to facilitate adequate preparation and effective participation.
- 3.7 Once again he congratulated MSG members upon their appointment and called on them to serve above self.

MIN 4.0: REVIEW AND ADOPTION OF THE MINUTES OF THE 39TH MSG MEETING

- 4.1 The Minutes of the 39th MSG meeting, that was held on 12th February 2026, were adopted with amendments following a review of the action log.
- 4.2 Matters Arising:

- a) Under Minute 4.5(b), the Secretariat was advised to prepare a presentation of the report following the visit to the URA customs office at Entebbe International Airport regarding gold exports.

MIN 5.0: PRESENTATION OF THE PRELIMINARY SCOPE FOR THE 5TH EITI REPORT

5.1 The representative from the Uganda Revenue Authority presented the preliminary scope for the 5th EITI Report to the MSG. The presentation was for purposes of information. The key highlights were as follows:

- a) The EITI reporting process is an annual undertaking that includes the disclosure of revenues, contracts and licenses, beneficial ownership, and production data.
- b) The process is implemented with MSG oversight and involves data collection, scoping, and reconciliation. All these tasks are performed by an Independent Administrator. The process concludes with the publication of the report.
- c) The Uganda Revenue Authority (URA) plays a key role in the reporting process by generating and submitting the required revenue data. It also fills in and submits the required reporting templates for certification by the OAG.
- d) The preliminary scope of the 5th EITI report considered the active licenses for FY 2023/24 in both the petroleum and mining sectors.
- e) Key activities undertaken by URA included linking Tax Identification Numbers (TINs) to licensees, extraction of revenue data and its submission to the UGEITI Secretariat, and engagement with the Department of Geological Surveys and Mines (DGSM) to provide TINs for the license holders that the URA system had not identified.
- f) From the preliminary analysis, a total of 22 companies that paid UGX 750 million and above had been proposed for reconciliation because these companies' revenues represented over 98% of total extractive revenues for the reporting period.
- g) Key anticipated challenges included collecting data from the petroleum companies that had ceased operations in the country, including Oranto Petroleum Uganda and Armour Energy; difficulty in tracing some mining companies, and separating manufacturing from extractive revenues, particularly for cement companies.

5.2 Reactions from Members

- a) A representative from MoFPED recommended that MEMD should only grant licenses to individuals with TINs to minimise data discrepancies and improve traceability. In response, the presenter noted that DGSM required additional funding to upgrade its systems to effectively meet this requirement.

- b) He added that URA was developing a data management system for the petroleum and mining sectors to enable project level revenue reporting.
- c) A member from the Industry Constituency advised that the separate classification of mining and manufacturing facilitated accurate reporting as they constituted distinct business activities.

5.3 The MSG appreciated the presentation and thanked the URA member for the information.

MIN 6.0: DISCUSSION ON THE EXTRACTIVES AWARENESS WEEK 2026

6.1 This was led by the Communications Officer who had previously presented the concept note and programme for the event during the MSG induction workshop. The highlights of the discussion were the following:

- a) The objective of the Extractives Awareness Week was to strengthen awareness, transparency, and accountability in Uganda's extractive sector.
- b) The event was planned for 5th to 7th May 2026 at Serena Hotel, Kampala.
- c) The planned activities included the procession and official launch, media engagements, stakeholder dialogues, exhibitions, and digital campaigns.
- d) The event would bring together stakeholders from government, industry, civil society, Media, and communities from extractive regions.
- e) The expected outcomes included increased awareness and use of EITI findings, improved coordination among stakeholders, and strengthened public accountability.

6.2 Reactions from Members

- a) The MSG sought clarification on the availability of funds to support the event. The Chairperson inquired whether the activity had been included in the budget for the current financial year. He emphasised the preparation and publication of the 5th EITI Report by the reporting deadline of 30th June 2026 as UGEITI's overriding priority. He guided that the activity should take place subject to availability of funds.
- b) The representative from URA requested the Secretariat to engage the URA Commissioner General to secure financial support and enhance EITI's visibility within the institution. In response, the Chairperson advised that each MSG member should serve as UGEITI's ambassador in their respective institution, and should be responsible for engaging and sensitising their institution on EITI activities.
- c) The representative from the Bank of Uganda expressed the Central Bank's willingness to provide financial support and noted that they would require a slot in the programme to profile the bank's mandate and priorities in relation to extractives.

- 6.3 The meeting agreed that a committee be set up to provide technical input and mobilise resources for the event. The following members were nominated:
- a) Ms. Gillian Lawino – MOFPED (Chairperson)

- 6.4 The MSG approved the concept, noting that execution of the activity as planned would depend on the availability of funds.

MIN 7.0: NOMINATION OF MEMBERS TO MSG COMMITTEES & RELATED MATTERS

The MSG discussed and agreed the need to establish committees to support the effective implementation of its mandate. Accordingly, members were nominated to the following committees.

- 7.3 The representative from the Petroleum Authority of Uganda (who had also served on the previous MSG) proposed that Mr. Paul Twebaze be appointed as a permanent observer on the MSG in line with Clause 6.1 of the MSG Terms of Reference. He noted that Mr. Twebaze possessed valuable institutional memory, technical expertise, and extensive experience from his previous service on the MSG.
- 7.4 **Reactions from Members.**
- a) A member from civil society commended Mr. Twebaze for his significant contribution but advised that the matter be considered holistically,

noting that there was need to consider other institutions, such as the Office of the Auditor General (OAG), which had also previously served as observers on the MSG.

- b) It was agreed that the matter be included as an agenda item for discussion at the next meeting, and that potential candidates be identified and requested to submit their CVs to inform an objective decision.
 - c) The Chairperson further advised the Secretariat that going forward, all agenda items that require MSG decisions should be supported by a concept note and any other relevant documentation, and shared with members at least 14 days prior to the meeting.
- 7.5 Following the discussion, the MSG instructed the Secretariat to include the appointment of members and institutions under Clause 6.1 (f) and (g) as an agenda item for the next meeting.
- 7.6 The Chairperson advised the Secretariat to have MSG meeting Minutes drafted by a lawyer to ensure legal accuracy and compliance.

MIN 8.0: WAY FORWARD

8.1 The MSG resolved as follows:

- a) Engage potential partners to mobilise resources to enhance support for UGEITI activities.
- b) Planning and preparation for the Extractives Awareness Week continue under the guidance of the appointed Steering Committee.
- c) At the next MSG meeting:
 - 1. present the report from the visit to URA customs office at Entebbe International Airport by MSG members.
 - 2. Include the appointment of observers under Clause 6.1 (f) and (g) of the MSG Terms of Reference.
- d) MSG meeting Minutes to be drafted by a lawyer.
- e) Agenda items be supported by relevant concept papers and shared with MSG members at least 14 days prior to meeting.

**REMARKS OF THE MSG CHAIRPERSON AT THE 41ST EITI
MULTI-STAKEHOLDER GROUP MEETING HELD ON 7TH MAY
2026 AT PROTEA HOTEL KAMPALA**

Representatives of Government,
Representatives of Civil Society,
Representatives of the Private Sector Industry,
Distinguished Members of the MSG,
Ladies and Gentlemen,

Good morning,

I am pleased to warmly welcome you all to the 41st meeting of the Uganda EITI Multi-Stakeholder Group. Allow me take this opportunity to share a few updates on developments regarding the EITI implementation process in Uganda:

1. Uganda's fifth EITI Report

Regarding the production of Uganda's fifth EITI report, I am pleased to note that the Secretariat is in the advanced stages of preparing this report, which is expected to be published by 30th June 2026. The report is particularly critical as it will provide updated disclosures on revenues, production, and governance in the extractive sector. It will also serve as a key reference document for our next Validation exercise.

Members should note that the scoping exercise has been undertaken and the Independent Administrator has established the nature and extent of data and information that will be considered during the preparation of the fifth EITI Report. This is a key milestone in the report production process and I encourage members to actively engage in today's discussion to ensure that the report comprehensively addresses the requirements of the EITI Standard.

2. Uganda's second EITI Validation

Members should note that Uganda is scheduled to undergo its second EITI Validation commencing on 1st October 2026. The Validation exercise will assess the country's progress in implementing the EITI Standard, and importantly, will rely significantly on the findings and disclosures contained in the fifth EITI Report. I therefore urge all stakeholders to continue supporting the Secretariat in completion of the data templates as well as assuring accuracy and quality in information and data submitted for consideration.

3. The 11th Oil and Gas Convention 2026

On behalf of the Multi-Stakeholder Group, I extend appreciation to our key stakeholders – The Uganda Chamber of Energy and Minerals and Petroleum Authority of Uganda, Ministry of Energy and Mineral Development, Uganda National Oil Company and other stakeholders that participated in organization of the 11th Oil and Gas Convention 2026.

The Convention provided a conducive space for various players in the industry to show case their products but also to promote investment opportunities, strengthen local content participation, and enhance dialogue among key stakeholders in the extractives sector.

As you are aware, Uganda's oil and gas industry is now at a critical stage. Key upstream projects have advanced significantly, with extensive investments in field development, infrastructure and associated facilities. These developments are expected to position the country as a competitive player in the global energy market.

Our focus remains on ensuring that oil revenues, once realized, are managed prudently, transparently, and in a manner that supports macroeconomic stability and growth.

In conclusion, the outlook for both the oil, gas and mining sectors is promising. With continued collaboration among government, private sector and industry players, there is no doubt that these sectors will significantly contribute to national growth, energy, security and prosperity.
